

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

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
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Our Lady of Fatima College The Beginning

After many meetings and correspondence, and disagreeing and agreeing and frustrations - with the Archbishop Ryan, Dr. Meenan, Principal of C.I.C. Fr. J. Byrne, CSSp, Fr. Flavin, O.P., P.P. of St. Theresa's Parish, and the CSSp Generalate in Paris, it was finally agreed that the Holy Ghost Fathers would be entrusted with the direction of the New Secondary School in the Woodbrook - Mucurapo area.

In deference to the Archbishop who had a great devotion to Our Lady of Fatima, it was to be called "Our Lady of Fatima College."

The new College opened on Monday 29th January 1945 in temporary quarters at St. Theresa's. It was a small two-room building with a partition dividing the two classrooms. There were 2 classes of 30 boys each. The staff was Fr. J. Byrne, CSSp, and Principal, who spent most of his days at the new building site on Mucurapo Road. He took the last class in the day.

The other members of staff - two in number - were Michael Mc Carthy, an Irish Holy Ghost Seminarian, and Andrew Cockburn - the first lay Teacher of the School.

It was on Monday 10th September, 1945 that Fr. Byrne transferred his boys to the New College where two classrooms were occupied. I had just completed my studies at St. Mary's and the Superior of the Holy Ghost Fathers, Dr. Meenan, Principal of C.I.C., asked me to teach at the New School. This was January 1945.

The first batch of boys numbered 60. Thirty in a classroom. The two of us teachers, Mc Carthy and myself switched classrooms during the day at the end of each period of class. We taught all subjects except Physics and Chemistry (No Labs). There were no such subjects as P.O.B., POX, Computer, and Technical Drawing. They just did not exist.

Towards the end of 1945 I was to leave Trinidad for Canada to join the Holy Ghost Fathers.

It was on 14th October that the Archbishop formally blessed the new School - "Our Lady of Fatima College."

The "mustard seed" was sown. And it was to flourish to what it is today.

O Lady of Fatima Hail! O Pray for us help us today, the hope of the human race.

The College of Our Lady of Fatima Traditions

Collins English Gems very simply defines the word "Tradition" as an unwritten body of beliefs, facts, etc. handed down from generation to generation. What then are the most important simple beliefs that have survived at Fatima College since 1945 that are still relevant today?

What is common between a Fatima College student of one generation and that

Our Catholic Tradition

In April, 1966, Fr. James Ryan (Fatima's second Principal) spelt out the role of Fatima College like this:

"This is a Catholic School. That is its salient feature, its first and most obvious characteristic; the majority of applicants here are children whose parents have asked for this school especially because it is Catholic..." ("History of Fatima College", Glen Roach)

In 1983, our fourth Principal, Mr. Mervyn

-"Students who leave these portals must be aware of the teachings of Christ and of their responsibilities. They must be motivated by Christian love..." (History of Fatima College", Glen Roach)

Each of these Principals identified in plain terms the way Fatima has, since its inception in 19 45, organized its daily activities. Each boy is given ample opportunity to develop in the Catholic faith and in its customs. How do we see this?

- "Holy Mass Two masses are offered daily in our chapel. On special occasions there are masses to accommodate each year
- · "Availability of priests to hear confession"
- "Daily community prayer Every day the Morning Offering ("Oh my God, I offer you..."); the Grace before Meals; the prayer

after lunch ("Oh God of Truth..."); and the closing prayer ("We fly to thy patronage...") are entered into by all students and teachers.

 "Emphasis on community service - Boys regularly visit children at the nearby Princess Elizabeth Centre.

Our Family Tradition

The Family plays a major role in any culture. It provides a person with a sense of belonging and purpose.

Here at Fatima College, we have maintained that family spirit by ensuring that we model the Holy Family (Jesus Christ, Mary and Joseph). The family spirit manifests itself in several ways.

- "All functions are organized with the participation of teachers, students, parents, and past students.
- "Form VI students assist younger students with their schoolwork and in the organization of extra-curricular activities.
- "In the classroom, teachers encourage "stronger" students to help those boys who are not doing so well in the subject.
- "An all-round education is a must. All beys are exposed to prayer, music, graphic cit, sports, photography, and audio/video production.

The result of Fatima's family spirit is summed up by a past pupil's quote that may be found in Fr. De Verteuil's "The History of the Holy Ghost Fathers". Fr. De Verteuil quotes the past pupil as saying,

'In Fatima College we seemed, despite (or because of) our second rate status as regards scholarships and intercol honours, to have more fun - there was more love.'

The words of this past pupil seem to copture the soul of the College of Our Lady of Fatima. Here, the student is nurtured and grows in stature and in truth. He gains a strong sense of self - discipline that will later serve him well in carrying out the duties associated with the God - given vocation he has been called to.

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The Rajah of Fatima

An appreciation to Father James Haynes Ryan C.S.Sp.

James Ryan has the advantage of being born into a large, happy and highly talented family. His attachment to his home was evident in the warm and glowing term in which he spoke to his sisters and brothers, and in the filial affection and devotion he manifested towards his father and mother.

The annals of Fr. Ryan's history have been chronicled and hymned elsewhere. He was appointed to Fatima in 1949 and from that day until he left us in 1979, his life, as Dean of Studies, Senior Master and Principal, was one of uninterrupted and unceasing service, of devoted sacrifice and committed involvement in the affairs of the young College. It was his joy to host her Silver Jubilee in 1967.

His office was run on efficiency; and while he had a tight schedule his vision was all the while scanning new horizons. With him at the



helm, Fatima steered into unchartered waters as the school became the first in the territory to introduce West Indian History and Commerce into the curriculum. With the Principal's interest for preparing his alumni for greater proficiency, they took a personal interest in the weekly 'Career Talks in the Assembly Hall.'

His light burning late at night became a landmark for travelers along the Mucurapo Road, as many required recommendations for the morrow's business interview were being penned.

Not a liturgist, in the strict sense of this term, he was a man of prayer and had a noteworthy devotion to the Patroness of the College, Our Lady of Fatima. The 13th of the month is associated with the Fatima observances and it is no slight coincidence that this son of Our Lady was professed on the 13th of October, assumed duties in Trinidad on October 13th, 1944 and died on August 13th and was laid to rest on the feast of Her Assumption.

A Message from Fr. Gregory

The Guardian's headline of Saturday May 14, 2005 read "Ghost School" referring to a school in Arima at which only 50% of the student population turned out the previous day. In that very week the Minister of Education referred to student arsonists. These are haunting signs of our times; it is certainly not the full story of education in our country but a story that calls us to reflect.

Fatima College celebrates its Jubilee Year and we too are reflecting on our history and our roots. Jubilee is a time of stock-taking. What then have the present concerns to do with us? Are we shielded or more privileged? Is the Fatima boy of a different stock from others?

We are all cut from the same fabric of this nation; we must take account of our sacred responsibilities to our brothers and sisters particularly the very young, the aged and the most vulnerable. The Founding Fathers responded to the call in a time of great transition 1944 - 45 which marked the end of the Second World War.

There was an increased demand for secondary education. The fathers said a clear yes to this need. We too, sixty years later, must say a clear yes to the demands of our time. Our faith tells us that the crises that we face will indeed be overcome, for by striving we will conquer.

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HISTORY OF FATIMA COLLEGE

The College of Our Lady of Fatima began under very humble circumstances on the compound of St. Theresa's Intermediate School in January 1945. The pioneering members of staff were Fr. John Byrne, Michael Mc Carthy (prefect) and Mr. Andy Cockburn, layman now a priest.

The association with St. Theresa began with Parish Priest Fr. Francis Flavin, O.P, who first recognized the need for an additional Catholic College in North Trinidad. His immense foresight led to the establishment of this great educational institution.

Work on the present site began in February under the astute supervision of Fr. Byrne. He even recruited labour from the islands as many locals toiled for the yankee dollar. In September classes shifted from St. Theresa and on December 1st, Archbishop Ryan formally blessed and opened this new College dedicated to our Lady of Fatima. The College was designed to create an atmosphere of intimacy and community.

Fr. Byrne retired in 1955 after overseeing the building of the Eastern and Western wings, the division of the Maraval River to accommodate the Assembly Hall, the construction of the chapel and three classrooms.

Fr. James Ryan succeeded him and developed the academic structures and systems of the College. Quietly and efficiently, he guided Fatima through the fifties and sixties when a new government came into power with revolutionary plans for education.

In the sixties, Fatima got its own uniform, held its own sports meeting, defeated C.I.C. to win its first Inter Col final in 1965 with the inspirational Gally Cummings and launched its own Old Boys Union. Fr. Girod joined Fatima in 1965, took charge of the Scouts and organized the first Mayfair in 1966. Fatima College had come of age.

The seventies witnessed many social changes in the country. Fatima led the way with the almost inevitable transfer from clerical to lay control with

1972. Fr. Farfan, local Holy Ghost Father, was appointed Vice Principal, and these two dynamic individuals directed Fatima through the seventies with many novel changes. The production of a well-rounded individual dominated Fatima's philosophy.

The period was characterized by the building of the Audio-Visual Centre, Library, New Classrooms, Cafeteria, Workshops and curriculum and class changes. Streaming was abandoned in the lower forms and students were now placed in alphabetical order. The concept of free choice of subjects was introduced from Form Four. The curriculum was diversified to include Art, Physical Education, Industrial Art, Technical Drawing, Accounts and Commerce.

Daphne Heywood and Jeanette Zakour joined the staff in 1973, heralding the entrance of women in a male dominated institution. Fatima won Inter Col for the second time in 1979 whilst Eugene Joseph and Roger Hernandez became our first Island Scholars in 1976. Fatima was now definitely ranked as one of the leading institution in the country, a model of academic and sporting prowess, catering for the needs of every pupil.

Clive Pantin retired in 1981, having served Falima as Dean, Senior Dean, Senior Lay Master, Cricket and Football Coach, Vice Principal, Principal. He was succeeded by Mervyn Moore who joined the staff in 1959. He recognized the work of his staff and allowed them the freedom to use their initiative.

Just about every individual was assigned some responsibility and brought into the organizational structure at the school.

At the function to welcome him as the new Principal, Mr. Moor declared his priorities - the Catholic identity of the school, the rise in academic standards, the fostering of the family spirit and the continued production of well-rounded individuals.

Music was introduced to the curriculum with the arrival of Myrtle Cumberbatch. Fatima published its first Annual in 1982, Kieron James won the President's Medal in the same year, a first for

1972. Fr. Farfan, local Holy Ghost Father, was Fatima. Kyle Rudden repeated the feat in 1984.

In the eighties and nineties, the lay teachers got more involved in the teaching of Religion with the departure of many priests who had served Fatima faithfully throughout the years.

The nineties saw the addition of two new faces to the administration of the school - Bernard Tappin as Vice Principal in 1991 and Fr. Gregory Augustine, Fatima product, as manager in 1992. The dress uniform was reintroduced in 1995 to coincide with our fiftieth Anniversary celebrations. The Support Group Fatima and Friends 2000 was formed to give way to a more broad based Parent Support Group a few years later.

Fatima boys are now excelling in a wide range of activities - Chess, Scrabble, Math Olympiad, Public Speaking, Essay Writing Competitions, Poetry, Model United Nations, Junior Soca Monarch, RBTT Young Leaders and Swimming. Our choir is a source of pride whilst our Form Six boys undertake social projects with the Credo Centre and the Princess Elizabeth Home. Our Scout Troop is on its way to be ranked once more amongst the best in the Country.

The leadership mantle has been handed over to Mr. Anthony Garcia. He is working very closely with Vice-Principal, Mrs. Anne Gomes-Phillips and the Manager, Fr. Gregory Augustine in the shaping of Fatima's future. They have inherited a highly professional staff, very committed to Fatima.

They have sought to build on Fatima's strength and improve on any areas of weaknesses. Plans for the future involve the enhancement and expansion of the physical facilities and increase of Form Six intake. These are costly venture requiring time, effort and proper planning.

Fatima's future is indeed very bright. All the ingredients are there for Fatima to remain a foremost educational institution - solid foundation, visionary leadership, committed staff, meaningful structures, supportive parents and Old Boys, rich culture and traditions, and most of all, the spiritual at the core of all our activities.

Fatima College Dedicated to Our Lady of Fatima.

This school is dedicated to Our Lady of Fatima, who appeared to three Portuguese children on the 13th of every month from May to October, 1917. Her message and appeal for conversion, prayer, and penance by all people to avert Almighty God's wrath, and to restore peace to the world are as urgent today as they were then. Recent apparitions in Nicaragua and Yugoslavia have repeated the appeal and the warning.

Everyone connected with Fatima College, students and staff, past and present, is reminded of this obligation to work and pray for the peace of the world by personal conversion, daily prayer, penance, fasting, and loving one another. This is the best way that we can show that we come from the College of Our Lady of Fatima.

COLLEGE CREST AND MOTTO

CREST.

This was selected by the first principal, Fr. Byrne, and placed on the Fatima flag, which was officially blessed by His Grace, the Archbishop Count Finbar Ryan O.P. on May 13th 1947.

The Holy Ghost, represented by the dove, is the emblem of the congregation of the Holy Ghost Fathers. The six white roses represent the six apparitions of Our Lady to the children at Fatima, Portugal. Blue and Gold are traditionally Our Lady's colours.

Congregatio Sancti Spiritus - C.S.Sp.

Congregation of the Holy Ghost Fathers was founded in France in 1703 by Father Claude Francois Poullart des Places, a young man only 30 years old. In 1848 the Congregation of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (founded in France in 1842 by Venerable Francis Libermann, a convert Jew) was joined to it by a decree of His Holiness Pope Pius IX.

Thus, the official title of the congregation now is Congregation of the Holy Ghost under the potronage of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The special aim of the Congregation is to undertake the more difficult works of apostleship and education, especially in missionary lands, and for which the Church less easily finds apostolic workers. The Holy Ghost Fathers were established in Trinidad in 1863 when St. Mary's College was founded. Fatima College was started in 1944 and St Anthony's by Father Gerard Pantin, a Holy Ghost Father, 1969.

You see, I first started teaching there in 1950 - I was sixteen years old. I taught for seven months, January to July 1950 - then I left to go to Canada and then Ireland to study with the intention of becoming a priest. I returned to Trinidad in 1954, did not pursue my studies for the priesthood, but continued to teach at Fatima College from 1954 - 1981.

They were undoubtedly the happiest days of my life, and it was my privilege to see Fatima progress from "another school" to which you sent your son if he did not get, into CIC to the No. 1 school in Trinidad and Tobago. The College simply grew from strength to strength with some wonderful principals and teachers to

become the school that it is today.

I remember with fondness and admiration, Fr. J.E. Byrne, Fr. Ryan (the "Raj"), all those splendid priest and prefects who taught at Fatima along with some great lay teachers such as Mr. Carlton Craigwell (later to be principal at Belmont Intermediate) and Mr. Van Stewart (later to be Principal of QRC).

Our great motto "Nitendo Vinces" and our school song ideally give the story of Fatima College.

The final thought I would like to share is that "Fatima Boys never give up!" We learnt this from the many years we tried to win an Intercol until we eventually broke through in a memorable victory. There was no stopping Fatima after that.

Congratulations, Fatimal May you continue to uphold the wonderful tradition you have had and remember always "Come answer to your call."


One of those who were called and who fought the good fight for the last 19 years, is Mervyn Anthony Moore. Mervyn was born on December 7th, 1939 at Lockhart Lane in Belmont. From infancy he revealed character traits that were to remain with him to this day - his stubbornness and thirst for knowledge.

So the clock has now stopped but the time Mervyn has spent with us these 41 years will live in the annals of Fatima as the most successful academic period of the college's life to date. Up to 1981 when Mervyn became Principal, Fatima had only won a total of 6 scholarships. In 1982 there were 7 scholarships and we have averaged 5 scholarships per year since then, including 2 Presidents Medals for Mathematics.

But Fatima has never been in the business only of Academic Achievement; Mervyn Moore has continued the tradition of his predecessors Byrne, Ryan and Pantin and has fostered a culture of caring and understanding that have given Fatima its unique quality.

Despite the fact that Mervyn is the longest serving Principal of a Holy Ghost College in the living memory he has been a remarkably misunderstood leader. His leadership was not the outgoing public friendly kind characterized by Clive Pantin, or the highly organized and spiritually tailored one of James Ryan. It had a humble, self-effacing quality. It was often egalitarian to the extent that staff felt he was listening more to parents and students than to understand his style and developed their own, without fear or intimidation.

They grew close in a way that few other staffs

have. Sure there were times when Mervyn would drive you to distraction by refusing to listen, by "shutting off". I guess in his own peculiar wisdom he knew that everything would eventually sort itself out. Perhaps we were living in the Voltarian Best of all-possible worlds without knowing it.

Now, Sadly, too late perhaps we do. In the words of the Gospel today and in those of Anne. Gomes-Phillips, his leadership was of the Shepard, shepherding his flock along the path of justice and fairplay.

Fatima today ranks among the six top boys colleges in Trinidad & Tobago From our objective point of view, Fatima is number one and I can say without fear of contradiction that there is no school anywhere, where staff and students have felt more at home.

Thank you Mervyn Moore, and know that you are always welcome to come and get that old clock working again.

Freddie was a reliable and competent groundsman, a cheerful, tireless, dependable woker, a simple, humble, respectable man, utterly loyal and faithful to Fatima. According to teacher lan des Vignes, "he was an institution within and institution".

Mary, the Mother of Fatima

Mary Abdul worked in Fatima for a short while and impressed Fr Thomas Curtin with her simple, cheerful, uncomplaining nature. She was offered a permanent job and remained in Fatima for twenty-nine years.

The kitchen was a pivotal point in Fatima. Teachers vicariously enjoyed Mary's well-prepared dishes on our way to classes. We would stop off to chat, sip a cup of tea, unburden our problems and seek her advice.

It is in the kitchen that Mary functioned as cook, narrator, historian, confidante, counsellor, nurse to ailing students, dean to errant ones. Many teachers reported to the kitchen upon arrival and signed off on departure.

Mary retired on Carnival Friday 1987 and was presented with a fan and a recliner. She lived in Quamina Street in "the house where they make the moon" in reference to Mary's participation in Hosay celebrations. She died in February 1997.



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How Great Thou Art Sports

Sport always plays an important part of any youth's development. Fatima College having recognized that has always stressed the importance of producing balanced students. While the academics are important so are the spiritual and physical aspects.

Fatima College over the years has produced many fine sportsmen – both on the field of play and administrators. We have done well in all sporting disciplines at the national and international level. During my time at college Jan 1962 to June 1968 I witnessed the college doing reasonably well in all aspects of sport-

Basketball – many of us may remember the battle between Fatima College and Tranquility at the Woodbrook Youth Center cor the championship – we went under unfortunately. The sport has continued to be played at the college with some measure of success. Jason Sharpe was granted a scholarship in the Fort Union Military Academy in Virginia, USA. Jason played four seasons with Fatima and led them to two North Zone Open Division finals in the Secondary Schools Basketball League.

Cricket - Joey Carew represented Trinidad and Tobago, eventually being appointed captain and serving us with distinction, he was selected to tour England in 1963, together with Willie Rodriguez and Derrick Murray. He did very well later on at tour to Australia. Joey represented the college in football in 1955 and played alongside Alvin Corneal. Alvin was a gifted cricketer and footballer who represented Trinidad in both disciplines and had he continued with the game of cricket could have represented the West Indies.

Noel Robinson also represented Trinidad and also managed the Trinidad and Tobago cricket team. The Prince... what more can we say about Brian Charles Lara that has not been already said - the ultimate cricketer, the Prince of Port of Spain. He was destined to greatness from his early days at Fatima College, he later lead the Trinidad and Tobago Youth team to many victories. The numbers 375, 400 and 500 are all familiar to us. Mention must be made of Ralph Gosein an international and well respected cricket umpire who served the game with distinction.

Michael Roberts was another gifted batsmen who was unfortunate not to be selected for the 1975 youth tournament, although in the 1974 his aggregate was over 600 runs.

Swimming – the 60th anniversary celebrations has really the student population to excellence in 2005...this year being the first that Fatima College was able to defeat St.Mary's college at swimming – this in itself is a great achievement.

Football – I always remark that when old boys meet me in the road the first question they would ask "you think we have a good side this year?". Strangely enough no one asks about scholarships, cricket or any sport, but they are mostly interested in football. Fatima played its first intercol match in 1952 against CIC and lost

2 - 0. It was not until 1965 that we won our first North Final beating QRC 4 - 2 in the finals. In the first match we were down 2 - 0 with 2 minutes to

go....we equalized. Special honour must be paid to the 1965 Intercol team for breaking our 12year drought. We were also National Winners then. It was not until 1979 that we won again beating St. Augustine 2 - 1 at the Queen's Oval. This year we repeated the victory beating St. Augustine by a similar margin..the road to the top was tough literally getting past Mucurapo Snr Comprehensive and Naparima "at the death" and on penalties. Although we have produced many very good footballers, Intercol always seemed to elude us, notwithstanding some memorable performances. The college has produced some very good footballers in - Alvin Corneal, Dick Rodriguez, Conrad Aleong, Herman Young, Everard "Gally" Cummings, Richard Stewart, Roger Duprey, Garnet Craig, Anton Corneal, Garnet Craig, Earl Fough, Jean Mouttet, Martin Bourne, Bobby Banfield, Graeme Rodriguez, Dennis Cuthbert, just to name a few.

Lawn Tennis - Alan Price was lawn tennis champion of Trinidad and Tobago for many years



and ruled the roost with the Valdez brothers.

Table Tennis – Stanley Hunte is the President of the Trinidad and Tobago Table Tennis Association and has continued to serve the sport well.

Cycling - Hayden Moore represented Trinidad and Tobago in the sport and was around the same time that Roger Gibbon ruled the roost in cycling. Hayden was an excellent cyclist; those of us who followed the sport closely would have remembered the many wonderful victories by Hayden. Ian Nivet was a very good cyclist and later a coach. Ian remembers the early days when the St. Mary's and Fatima College sports were held together at St Mary's grounds. One of his greatest achievements was winning the Victor Ludorum almost single handedly, he remembers being carried shoulder high by his schoolmates from St Mary's ground to the college.

Athletics – Golden Bolden – Ato though not winning a Gold medal at the Olympics has won more medals, four, at that level than any other local athlete. As a Junior he won the 100 and 200

meters race in South Korea – unprecedented in the sport. Ato is only one of six men ever to run sub 10 secs and 20 secs in the 100 and 200 meters respectively. Ato also became the second person to run a sub 10 for the 100m and sub 20 in the 200m in the same day. With his commitment dedication and commitment Ato has represented the spirit and ideals of Fatima.

We cannot forget <u>Carver King</u> who left Fatima College in December 1962, a member of the Mannie Dookie School of athletics he represented Trinidad and Tobago with pride, in the 800 and 1500 meters distances. He received a scholarship to attend university in Maryland, USA where he and his family still resides. Carver was the first Fatima College student to be awarded athletics scholarship.

Gerard Clarke was one of the most promising middle distance runners in the 60's and 70's he broke the 800m record and was literally unbeather in the second of the second 1500 meters distances. Gavyn Jerome Nero - 14 year old Garvyn won the country's first silver medal at the Carifta Games in 2005 which were held in Tobago, he also won gold in the 3000 metres event. He represented T & T in the triathlon, duathon, aguathon. Gavyn has his

His sights set in the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

Rugby – the college has also participated in the sport of rugby. It was a proud Mathew Johnson who capteined the Trinidad and Tobago under 19 Rugby team in the West Indies Under 19 Championships held in Guadeloupe in June 2001.

Hockey – At one time we ruled the roost in college's league, out of this, the Fatima Hockey Club was formed and has participated in the Hockey championship division for many years, Players like Dean Nieves have represented Trinidad and Tobago with pride and glory.

Squash - the 2005 Queen's Park Cricket Club Sportsman of the Year is a 15-year-old Fatima College student - Justin Sanguinette. Young Justin is to be certainly congratulated on his achievement at such a tender age - but that is the spirit of the Fatima College student.
